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


In 2008 my family and I moved to Magnolia, AR to serve as pastor of Calvary Baptist Church. At the forefront of what I brought with me to Magnolia was a desire to pastor a missionary sending church. This was something God put in my heart, but I didn't know if it would be a desire of our church. In 2009, I shared with Calvary concerning my burden to send a missionary. They prayed and one month later voted unanimously to send someone to a field of labor. The church was in perfect unity about this endeavor. We were all excited and anticipated God doing something amazing. We were ready to move forward. What happened next was totally unexpected.

Keep in mind that Calvary had never been a sending church. None of us really knew what would be expected. All we had was excitement, desire, and a burden to see this through. We wanted to do this, but we didn't really know what to do. We prayed and formed a mission committee. Those both seemed like the right things to do. Our church prayed that God would raise up a man and send him our way. Remember, this is in 2009. We were ready, but we were not prepared. God had a plan for us to wait.

Our church prayed for four years that God would raise up a man for us to send. We didn't care if he came from our church or from somewhere totally unexpected. We weren't lacking for zeal, however, God had some details concerning faith that He wanted to work out. In one of our first mission committee meetings the conversation turned to finances. The main question was, "how will we ever be able to afford this?" It seemed as though finances dominated the discussion each time we met. I wrestled with discouragement often through this process. Why would God not give us a man to send? Why do we only talk about money every time we meet? The answer to the latter question is the answer to the former question. God knew that we were more focused on finances that fulfilling this burden.

I remember it like it was yesterday. We met with the mission committee one Sunday afternoon and the topic of finances came up again. A man stood and said, "if we wait until we can afford to do mission work, we'll never do mission work." He went on to explain by using the analogy of marriage and raising a family. If we

wait until we can afford to get married, we never will. If we wait until we can afford to raise children, we will never get there. The same is



After four years of praying, questioning, refocusing, and learning, God brought us two families with a burden for Indiana. Missionaries Scott Bourland, Kevin Pruitt, and their families were ready to be sent together to Bloomington, IN. We were praying for one, but God was preparing two. Throughout the preparation process God had helped us understand that the work of missions is His work. We are simply privileged to be included. He makes the decisions on who, where, when, and how. That's not for us to fret over. Our church met the Bourland and Pruitt's and voted unanimously to partner with them and send them to Indiana.

You have no idea how God will use you and your friendship to encourage and even keep the missionary on the field.

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Fellow Helpers to the Truth

When you think of the Air Force, you probably think of pilots. You can probably envision men and women scurrying up ladders, sliding into cockpits, closing canopies, and launching

into the sky. And when you think of missions, you probably think of missionaries. You probably envision them selling their possessions, visiting churches, packing their bags, and heading off to the field to which God has called them.

Did you know, however, that only 4% of the US Air Force personnel are pilots who scurry up ladders and launch into the sky? Did you know that 96% of the people who make up "the largest, the most technologically evolved, and the most powerful air fleet in the world" never sit in a cockpit? They bring a very different set of skills and labor to "the world's premiere aerospace force".

This is also true of the Lord's missionary force. Only about 7% of evangelical Christians pack their bags and head out to serve as missionaries (i.e. those who are called by God and sent by their church to serve in places beyond the normal reach of their local church's ministry). The vast majority of God's missionary force do not "go" but rather serve as senders and supporters. This is a critical but often misunderstood and under appreciated role in missions.

The apostle John told one of the early churches, "Because that for his name's sake they went forth, taking nothing of the Gentiles. We therefore ought to receive such, that we might be fellow helpers to the truth" (3 John 7-8). Paul continually gave thanks to God for the Philippian church and their "fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now" (Phil. 1:5).

During our years in Indonesia, our family and ministry thrived, and a big part of that was due to the tremendous support we received from churches "back home". We had sufficient financial support to do everything we needed to do (and usually even more than we needed). We had regular, encouraging communication from churches and church members, including emails, text messages, calls and video chats. Our sending church leadership and members visited our field multiple times. We had long-term mentors who spent time with us in our village. We had a prayer team of over 100 people who regularly and eagerly prayed for the ministry and our family. We had people who printed, folded and mailed our newsletters. We had a CPA who freely helped with our taxes. We often received packages with "tastes from home". When we returned on furlough our sending church secured phones, a vehicle, warm clothes, and other items that we would need stateside. And this list could go on and on.

The main point is that there were literally hundreds and hundreds of "fellow helpers" involved in the ministry taking place deep in the heart of the world's second largest rain forest. Not only did that keep us refreshed and encouraged and help make the gospel available to a remote tribe of people, but it also gave each of those "fellow helpers" a tangible way to be involved in God's work in a place far from their home.

Both missionaries and churches need to experience that "fellowship in the gospel". Just as the Air Force is comprised of thousands and thousands of airmen, both in the sky and on the ground, with a single purpose, the Lord's churches have a wide diversity of people with single commission. And the small percentage of people who are called and sent to go and serve in new places need an army of "fellow helpers" praying, encouraging, helping, supporting, and enabling them to "Go... and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever [he has] commanded [us]".

Struggles of a Missionary Family

Have you ever wondered how to pray for a missionary family? Do you wonder about the daily challenges and struggles they face? While God gets all the glory and His grace is enough to face each day, they face many obstacles that go unseen. Sometimes we would love to share but we do not want to come across as complaining or taking for granted the special calling God has placed on our lives.

My family and I served as missionaries to the Coast of Kenya, Africa for five years; here are some of our personal struggles while on the field. While some of these struggles may seem personal, many of them will be generic to missionaries and their families. The struggles have been broken down to major categories:

LONELINESS AND LANGUAGE LEARNING

When you move to another country and culture, first your family and friends feel like you are moving very far from them, and while many promise to stay in touch, the longer you live on the field, the more you lose touch with others as their lives move on to other people and daily demands. A missionary can begin to feel isolated and lonely. This loneliness takes on many different forms over the years.

Holidays, birthdays, anniversaries, and celebrations can feel lonely. Not being able to invite your family to your son's first birthday or come to your daughter's kindergarten graduation or celebrating Thanksgiving or Christmas alone can be a huge struggle especially when you see pictures of your friends and family celebrating back home. Although you are happy to see their pictures or Face Time call back home, there is a deep longing to be celebrating with those you love.

At first not knowing the language well makes a missionary feel lonely, because it is difficult to have a friend if you cannot communicate with them. As you learn the language you still feel friendless, because just a few greetings and phrases limits you from developing deep, close relationships that you desire, relationships that came much easier to you when you were in your home culture. Now not only do you desire to meet and have friends, as a missionary you also have the weight

of a job, the desire of sharing the gospel and preaching where others

can relate and allow the LORD to speak to them. From first arriving to the field feeling friendless to feeling like sharing the good news of Jesus in a new language is far out of reach, learning language can become a daunting task.

A missionary needs encouragement and to remember God's calling. God called me to this place, and God will provide for me. We started to pray that God would teach us the language in order for us to share the good news of Jesus with those who have never heard. We began to memorize the Roman Road in Swahili. This greatly helped us learn the language as well as meeting weekly with our amazing language teacher. At the beginning, we would meet 5 days a week, then 3 days a week, then twice a week, and then finally to once a week with our language teacher to help write sermons and devotionals. We were blessed to have a language teacher who also went to church with us and fully believed the Bible as God's Word. She was able to help us effectively learn to share the gospel and communicate properly when teaching and preaching. Not all missionaries have a teacher who is so knowledgeable about the Bible. Trying to communicate without the message getting lost in translation can be a real challenge.

At first learning some of these new things are fun and adventurous, but other times, when you must greet each person and talk for a while, shake hands a certain way, and make sure to do everything culturally appropriate without making a language mistake can be frustrating and the day-to-day interactions can begin to feel taxing. Simple everyday tasks take much longer. Going to the store to buy bread can take over 30 minutes just to make sure you properly have greeted and talked with each person at the store. Not greeting them there means that you might be mad at them or no longer their friend.

As we were learning Swahili, we lived in Tanzania at a language school. While we were there, we went a few months with no electricity and at this time my wife will recall needing to go to the restroom in the night. We were living in small apartments at the school that

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connected to the apartment next to us. One night when she got up to go to the restroom, there were two small glowing eyes looking back at her without any way to turn on the light, a rat! She refused to go to the bathroom again until the rat was gone.

While living in Kenya, Amber met with a small group of women who would study the Bible together weekly. A very sweet woman that attended the Bible study asked Amber to pray for her because she was having tummy trouble. Amber prayed for her, but also told her that she thinks it is due to the water she is drinking. The woman laughed and said in Swahili of course, "No, no, no, it is not the water." Several months later, Amber noticed the same woman was pregnant, and another friend told Amber to please pray for the woman because she has had several miscarriages over the years. Amber then saw that she made a language mistake all of those months ago. Thankfully, the women all prayed together, and this dear woman gave birth to a healthy baby boy named Baraka, which means Blessing. This woman had given her life to God a few months prior to giving birth, so all the women praised God for giving her such a blessing as a sweet baby boy. The woman was right. It wasn't the water giving her tummy trouble, but a major prayer request that was almost missed due to a language barrier.

In the area where Amber would walk to meet ladies for Bible study, she would walk past a few homes, where a few women would call out mean words and mean things as she walked by not knowing that she could speak Swahili and could understand them. Most of the time it would be mean names based on her color of skin. Thankfully over time, some of these women gave their lives to Christ and started attending the Bible study weekly.

One time we were able to share the gospel in a village where the Dad asked Jesus to be his Savior, the mom, the teenage son, and the grandma. That day reminded us of the jailer who was saved and his entire house except there was also a grandfather in the same house where we tried to share the gospel with him as well. We shared in Swahili and since all of his family just gave their lives to Christ, he leaned in and tried hard to understand. The more we would share the more he would say he could not understand. He spoke another dialect. We told his family that they must be the ones to tell him since he could not understand us.

LIVING CONDITIONS

When we would go to town to buy groceries or do daily errands, our family stuck out visibly. People could look across and see we were different than everyone else. We stood out, and sometimes that was good, but many times that meant strangers coming up to us begging for money or for a job. One time someone even tried to follow us home.

Fourteen days. Fourteen days is the longest streak of time we lived without power and running water while living in Kenya. That meant we had to buy large 5-gallon bottles of water. The mosquitoes swarmed our hot, sweaty heads at night without a fan, and we could not wash our hands or use the toilet without having a bowl or bucket of water nearby.

In the first house we lived in, frogs lived in our toilet. Geckos crawled across the ceiling. In the evening lying in bed after a long day, a gecko would be seen crawling across overhead. They were welcomed mosquito eating friends. We almost forgot about them until one evening settling down in bed, we hear a shrill scream coming from the room of a young intern. When we go in to check on her, she is screaming about a gecko. This did make us laugh, and we remembered that we have gotten use to seeing them. We would take a gecko or a frog over a rat any day. We had a few struggles with rats that we will go into greater detail later.

One week when meeting the ladies in a Bible study in the home of the same woman, Baraka's Mama, Amber saw a rat. She did not want to be rude. All the ladies were reading the Bible together and sharing all God was doing in their lives when Amber saw a rat climbing around the house. None of the ladies reacted in any way but continued to read and share. Then the rat walked right over Amber's shoes. She wanted to squeal, jump, move, but since none of the ladies reacted, she sat completely still.

Our last year living in Kenya, a field next to us was cleaned and all the cats and rats moved next door, where we were living. We caught over 17 rats in a fourmonth period. I think Amber was ready to move out! Our dogs caught different snakes. There are many poisonous ones living there. Many that we are not used to seeing and sometimes they try to come inside.

THE HARDEST THINGS

Missionaries miss the 3 F's, family, friends, and food. Not seeing your family and friends for years at a time. When we first moved to Kenya, my grandfather passed away. Amber's nephew was born, and we did not get to meet him until he was almost two years old.

Having mission teams over was a huge blessing, and one time a young guy made us crack up when he shared with the group that he was really missing cheeseburgers and how he couldn't wait to get home to eat one. We laughed and said we hadn't had our favorite cheeseburger in over a year while you have been away for only a week. Care packages to missionaries can be great and an encouragement to get small things even Kool Aid packs for missionary families with kids. Before visiting a missionary, ask them about some of their favorite things that you could bring with you when you visit like their favorite candy, any special toiletries, or items they would like. Bring them a few jars of peanut butter, Velveeta, taco seasoning, and/or any special requests. Seasonal items and treats are fun to get as well.

Living in a hot area with no a/c was very challenging to get used to, especially at first. Also taking cold showers were rough. For some reason, living in Africa, we always felt dirty. We would take a cold shower only to immediately get out and start sweating.

Children can be treated differently on the foreign field. Many kids would want to touch Nora's hair. While this did not bother Nora, JJ was not a fan. Also, finding affordable birthday gifts and Christmas presents for children in another country can be hard. A typical \$5 Barbie from America would be more than \$50 in a toy store in Kenya. We would tell them they would wait to get gifts on furlough.

ACCESS TO GOOD HEALTH CARE

When we would visit the hospital to pray over friends and visit those who wanted prayer, we saw a men's ward, women's ward, and a children's ward, a room full of twin beds with many beds full of two people. That would be hard to see, especially when both men or women had two completely different yet very contagious diseases or issues. Amber once went to visit her friend so she could go home to shower, get more clothes, and bring back items like towels and toilet paper. Patients had to provide their own blankets, sheets, and pillows. Also, patients could not leave the hospital until paying their full bill. Once Amber was called in the middle of the night to help her friend leave, because she owed \$10.

When JJ, our son, was about 14 months old, he had a febrile seizure. Our pediatrician was a couple of hours drive away, so we desperately needed one in Malindi where we lived. When Amber and JJ got checked in for the night, the power went out in their room. The next day, the nurses tried to draw JJ's blood by poking him with a needle and squeezing his arm. After they got 2 vials of blood, they said they needed 2 more vials to be able to see what caused JJ's seizure. When we could not get that much blood to come out, they sent us home saying it just must be a febrile seizure. We thank God that JJ returned to his healthy self, but needing medical care there can be rough.

These are some of the struggles a missionary family may face, and while some may seem silly, some are serious, that is why a missionary seriously covets your prayers and support.




